
Vote for the 2015-2016 School Calendar

Attendance at these hour-long meetings will be paid at committee stipend rate!



Cyberbullying Law Updated

Recently, Illinois' existing legislation was updated in an effort to further protect students from the effects of cyberbullying. The new law states that all schools will investigate instances of cyberbullying if it is found that the act of bullying is affecting the victim's ability to engage in school activities, even if the bullying behavior occurs outside of school, with non-school-owned resources, etc.

The new language in this law is still being discussed and interpreted by schools, and will likely make the news more often than it already has. (See this story on WHBF-TV News).

It is very important that schools expressly <u>teach Internet Safety lessons</u>, including how to recognize & deal with cyberbullying behaviors, during the course of every school year. In fact, it is the law. (<u>See below</u>)



Internet Safety Resources

Since the 2009-2010 school year, the <u>State of Illinois has mandated</u> that every student in grades 3-12 receive instruction in Internet Safety Topics every school year.

Auto-Play & Loop in Google Slides

To make a Google Slides Presentation automatically advance:

- Click File
- Select Publish To The Web...
- Select the preferred **Auto Advance Timing** (default is every 3 seconds)
- There are 2 other boxes you may or may not wish to select
 - Start slideshow as soon as the player loads This will depend on your preference
 - Restart the slideshow after the last slide if you want the show to play in a continuous "loop"
- Click the **Publish** button
- You'll be asked if you're sure... tell it you're sure...:)
- Then you'll see a bunch of messy code highlighted in blue. don't let it scare you! Just hold down the **CTRL** key and press **C** to copy it.
- Open a new tab in a browser.
- Click in the address bar
- Hold down the CTRL key and press V to paste that mess into the address bar
- Press your **ENTER** key, and your slide show should play.



Creating a STRONG Password

Creating passwords and keeping them secret are not behaviors that many students develop on their own. For some reason, students often think it is okay to share passwords with their friends. It is important to advise students at every grade level that student that passwords should never be shared with anyone besides a parent or school personnel.

School passwords can be changed as often as desired. Please teach students how to create complex passwords, and provide time on a regular basis (once a quarter, once a semester, etc.) to change these passwords to something unique each time. It is important to instruct students to make sure their school password is nothing like passwords for other services, like gaming, music services, etc.

Please work with students to develop a unique & strong password that will be very hard for others to guess. Here's an example, but don't use this exact password:

- Complex passwords are not found in the dictionary, are 8 characters or more, and use a combination of caps, lowercase, numbers & special characters
 - Start with a phrase, perhaps from a song or poem, like "O say can you see by the dawn's early light"
 - Just use the first letters of each word: oscysbtdel
 - Capitalize some of the letters: OscYsbtDel
 - Change other letters to numbers or special characters that look similar:
 O\$cY5btD3!

New Semester = New Password

Teach kids the importance of maintaining security online by reminding them to change their passwords regularly. Once a strong new password has been developed, here's how to use it with school resources:

When the student knows the old password

- District Web Page
- Point to Internal Links
- Click Password Change Tool
- In the first field, type the letters **ghs** then use the forward slash it looks like this \ and it lives **on the key between Backspace & Enter**, NOT with the question mark.
- Type the old password
- Type the new password
- Type it again, exactly
- Click Submit

When the student has forgotten the old password, or it just isn't working

- District Web Page
- Point to Internal Links
- Select Intranet Web Page
- Select Student Password Reset Tool
- Enter your network credentials (login & password)
- Enter them again
- Enter the student's ID number (from their ID card, etc.)
 - **BE CAREFUL!** If you mistype a number you could unknowingly reset some random student's password!
 - DO NOT allow students to do this!
- Click the Reset Student Password and Log This Activity button
- A random password will be generated write it down and give it to the student.
- The student can then change the password to something meaningful to them using the instructions above.
