PARCC Update

Grades 3-8 are wrapping up our first official PARCC Performance-based Assessment (PBA). High School students enrolled in Algebra 2 and/or English 11 will complete the PBA test in April. All of these students will also complete the End of Year (EOY) test during the month of May. Results from all of these tests will be aggregated into a score report after completion. We have not yet received an estimate of when these results will be available, nor do we know what the report will look like..

At this time we are aware of comparatively few problems with our online test delivery. We have had a large number of last minute details to sort out, and we have dealt with a few testing irregularities. We anticipate these will have very little impact on individual students' test scores, or overall school scores. Our network capacity and accessibility of test materials via Chromebooks has been nothing short of stellar compared with our experiences during last year's field test. We anticipate the EOY testing to go even more smoothly as we gain experience.

Thanks to all who have helped with test administration at buildings and in classrooms!

Classroom Spotlight: Jared Bruening

Jared Bruening, 8th Grade Social Sciences teacher at <u>Churchill Junior High School</u>, has been experimenting with the "flipped classroom" approach throughout this school year. Mr. Bruening has been recording background material for students in video format and posting to his class <u>YouTube Channel</u>. He assign students "homework" of watching his videos or those from other educational resources. He and his students then spend class time digging deeper into concepts, applying students' knowledge to current events, and creating/developing collaborative projects. Now students are getting into the act and creating their own videos to show what they have learned!

Google Tricks

<u>The Google Guru posted this list</u> of nifty but rarely-used search tools within the Google-verse. These include a quick coin-flip tool, Google Comparisons, Translator, and Boolean search tricks like "this -not that" and the asterisk tricks, to name a few.

One trick that is missing is the online timer. Just open the Chrome browser, type in **timer 15 min**, and press the enter key. Up pops a countdown timer that preset at 15 minutes! Try it with other random times to see how it works. Easy-peasy.

Cleaning Chromebooks

Questions are received frequently about how to clean student Chromebook devices, especially during cold & flu season. Here are a few tips:

- Only clean a device that is powered off completely and unplugged from a wall socket.
- Brushing & very light buffing are preferred cleaning methods. Any clean, soft cloth will do cut up old t-shirts, etc. Brush off the bits with a clean, soft, dry cloth first, or blow

- the crumbs & junk off the keyboard like you're whistling. Then buff the smudges on the case gently with that same clean, soft, dry cloth.
- AVOID using compressed or "canned" air. This usually just forces crud deeper into the device.
- If liquid cleaners are needed to cut through encrusted gunk, always spray the liquid very lightly onto on a cloth first, then wipe. NEVER spray water or liquid cleaners of any type onto a computing device.
- Premoistened wipes solely designed for cleaning electronic devices might be okay on the outer case, but avoid getting those near the keyboard, cooling vents, or any of the ports on the sides of the device. These can tend to get too saturated & drippy near the bottom of the container, too. Use extreme caution!
- Never use abrasive cleansers. Never use anything containing bleach or similar including premoistened wipes - on computing devices.
- AVOID pressing on the LCD screen of any device. Touchscreen Chromebooks are much more delicate than touchscreen tablets & smartphones that use "gorilla glass," etc. Be gentle.
- Gently use the edge or corner of a sheet of paper to get the gunk out of cracks/spaces around keyboard keys, trackpads, etc.
